FIND OUT HOW YOU CAN GRADUATE EARLY...

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Students who take courses during the Winter and Summer modules can complete their course work and earn their degrees quicker than students who just take courses during the Fall and Spring semesters !!!

Winter registration begins on November 5th. Students should meet with their academic advisor to discuss what courses they can take in the Winter module to help them graduate earlier.

Students can also take this opportunity to discuss their Spring semester courses with

their advisor. This also serves as an ideal time to ask their advisor to help them work out an academic plan to discover when they are expected to graduate.

An academic plan is a great way for students to ensure that they are taking the correct courses toward their degree and to make sure that they are Financial Aid and TAP compliant.

Students can find a list of where they can go to seek academic advisement on the last page.

Students should check E-sims to make sure they don't have any stops that will prevent them from registering for the Winter module and Spring semester.



E-sims is our student

registration system. To log onto E-sims you will need your social security/student ID number. Your PIN is your birthday, mmddyy.

E-sims allows you to register for your courses for the modules

and semesters. Remember, to register for the Winter module you will click on Fall 2007, there is no Winter link under registration.

E-sims also allows you to check your grades online by viewing your unofficial transcript or by viewing your schedule/grades. There is also a link to check out the open sections so

that you can see what courses are open and get the 4-digit registration code which is needed to register for that course. Students should print out a copy of their schedule for their records

E-sims also allows you to view your bill as well as pay your bill on-line. Students are advised to also print their bill for their records.

EXPLORING SENIOR COLLEGES: NOVEMBER IS CUNY MONTH

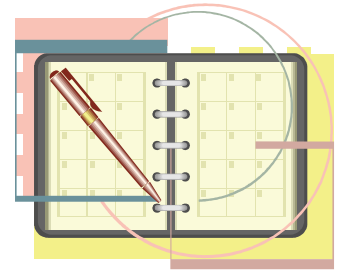
It is never too early to stop by the Transfer Office, C 102, to discover the academic opportunities open to you after Kingsborough Community College.

HEALTH CAREERS SPOTLIGHT: THERAPEUTIC RECREATION



The Academic Advisement Center for Health Careers is proud to present, the fall 2007 career spotlight **Therapeutic Recreation**. The American Therapeutic Recreation Association defines therapeutic recreation as the provision of recreation services to persons with illnesses or disabling conditions. If you would like to help provide positive health outcomes to individuals with psychiatric disorders, persons with developmental disabilities or persons disabled as a result of trauma or disease, then Therapeutic Recreation is the right career for you. This great program teaches students how to:

- ◆ Improve physical functioning
- ◆ Improve cognitive functioning
- ◆ Enhance social support
- ◆ Reduce reliance upon the healthcare system.

Kingsborough Community College's exciting A.A.S. degree in Therapeutic Recreation also includes a supervised fieldwork internship. Field work placement sites include N.Y.U. Medical Center (Tisch Pediatrics), Beth Israel North (Pediatric Neurosurgery), Asphalt Green Community Center, Project Connect, Brooklyn V.A. Hospital, Rivington House, Sephardic Nursing Home, and the United Cerebral Palsy Brooklyn Children's Program. Students can expect to earn \$20-\$25,000 with an A.A.S. degree. Salaries increase to \$36,000-\$38,000 with a Bachelor's degree. Students with a 3.5 GPA and higher may qualify for a scholarship at St. Joseph's College.

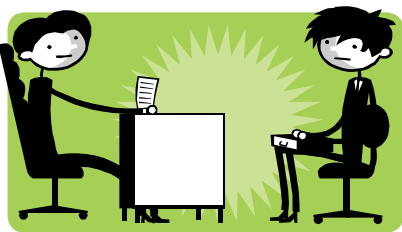
