Re: AA Liberal Arts-Concentration in Philosophy

Philosophy has always been considered an important, even necessary, component of a liberal arts education. Combining critical thinking with a broad range of questions probing the range of human thought whether scientific, humanistic, or artistic, and sporting some of the finest literature ever written, it provides students with an irreplaceable and essential window on the full range of what we term the "liberal arts." The Department of History, Philosophy, and Political Science now offers a broad range of philosophy courses covering all sorts of issues from religion to bioethics and from a broad range of perspectives including Asian and contemporary analytic as well as the traditional ancient Greek and modern European. As such, immersion in philosophy is integral to a Kingsborough AA.

Students have also shown a sustained and growing interest in the range of courses provided by the philosophy unit within the History, Philosophy, and Political Science Department. Many students in any given semester have taken at least three courses in Philosophy. Figures obtained from Kingsborough's Office of Institutional Research show that upwards of 100-200 students have taken three courses in any given semester and that over 500-1,000 have taken two [see attachment]. Since the concentration requires nine credits, a significant number would already qualify with probably more who migh be enticed by the promise of academic recognition for their effort.

Beyond that, anecdotally, every philosophy instructor has received requests for information on other courses that may be available in the discipline, usually from their most talented students. Some of these students go on to major in philosophy in the senior colleges to which they transfer and many seek a firm grounding in the intellectual fundamentals necessary to their education so that they may improve their chances for academic success as they move on.

CUNY-wide experience, including at a community college level, has demonstrated the enduring importance and popularity of philosophy as a major or concentration. For example, LaGuardia Community College instituted a major in the subject in the last few years and has seen strong and growing enrollment (currently at 57 majors). In the continuing effort to recruit and retain talented students, it is important that Kingsborough
provide an attractive and challenging range of academic courses that match the best of what the other CUNY colleges offer.

No new courses are needed to create this concentration in liberal arts. The exact proposal appears below.

We strongly encourage the approval of this proposal and placement on the agenda of the Curriculum Committee in time for it fall 2012 meeting.

## Proposed

## Concentration in Philosophy

As part of the above College and Liberal Arts requirements, students completing this concentration must take at least 9 credits of courses within Group A representing any combination of philosophy courses ( $\mathrm{PHI} 70-79$ ).

## COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS

- Successful completion of CUNY/Tests in Reading and Writing and the COMPASS Math Skills Test with passing scores or developmental courses may be required.
- One (1) Writing Intensive course in any discipline from any category below is required. Participation in a Learning Community that includes ENG 1200 also satisfies this requirement.
- Two (2) Civic Engagement interactions-satisfied by CE-Certified or CE-Component courses or approved outside activity. See the KCC catalog General Education: Civic Engagement section.
- HE 01400 Critical Issues in Personal Health
