RE: Course Description, Prerequisite, and Pre-/Co-requisite for SAC 3000 – Compulsive

Gambling: Treatment and Prevention for Substance Abuse Counselors

The Department of Allied Health, Mental Health and Human Services is proposing a change in Course Description, Prerequisite, and Pre-/Co-requisite for SAC 3000 – Compulsive Gambling: Treatment and Prevention for Substance Abuse Counselors

## **Course Description:**

#### FROM:

An overview of the history of wagering and its prevalence in today's society. Various forms of gambling are explored in particular relationship to substance abusing behavior. Sample cases are discussed, prevention principles and practice in assessment and referral are included.

## TO:

Students develop an understanding of gambling as a compulsive behavior often associated with substance use disorders. The historical phenomenon of wagering and its prevalence as a societal problem is explored. Clinical counseling and professional intervention with individuals and families are stressed, including assessment, treatment planning, referral/case management, as well as family and patient education. Evidence-based principles for prevention and intervention are also explored. This course also meets the eligibility criteria for the gambling designation – CASAC G, once other practice and supervised experience guidelines are met.

### **Rationale for Changes:**

The NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS), formerly the NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services "oversees and establishes guidelines for the comprehensive statewide education and training of New York State's credentialed addiction professional workforce and all staff who provide treatment, prevention and recovery services." In Fall 2018, OASAS mandated that all educational institutions who offer the 350-hours of education and training leading to the Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor Certification (CASAC) must offer a standardized curriculum. The changes in course description align with OASAS requirements in order to meet the Certification in Alcohol and Substance Abuse Counseling – Trainee (CASAC-T) credential.

Having **both** SAC 2000 – Introduction to Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counseling and SAC 2200 - Counseling Techniques in the Substance Abuse Field I, as prerequisites allows for proper course sequencing in the program and ensures that students have a solid grasp of information and materials covered in the introductory courses.

This course can be taken any time during the program after the prerequisites of SAC 2000 and SAC 2200 have been met.
