Theatre Arts Students in pursuit of the A.S. Theatre Arts Degree with Concentrations in Technical Production and Performance who are out of sequence in their practicum and are required to double enroll during the same semester.

This specific course is being created so that, if needed to graduate, students can double enroll in two practicum sections in a given semester in order to meet the degree requirements. Though able to be repeated, a student cannot enroll in the same course in the same semester. The creation of this course allows this unique situation to occur for students who are out of sequence in their practicum requirement. Having this course created eliminates the need for Independent Studies to address this same situation.

Course Description:

This practice-based course provides students with hands-on experience working onstage and backstage for live theatrical productions. Working within an ensemble of student and faculty theatre artists, students will practice and execute the theatre skills associated with acting, design, technical theatre, and stage management. This course may be taken up to five times for a total of four (5) credits.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Theatrical Practice: Students will examine and study various production roles, as well as apply techniques, theories and theatre-specific knowledge through the creation of theatrical productions.
- 2. Dramatic Literature: Students will study, analyze and realize significant works of dramatic literature from a diverse representation of genres and playwrights.
- 3. Collaboration: Students will work together as part of theatre ensemble where they will develop and apply group communication and team-building skills.
- 4. Community Engagement: Students will create and develop theatrical productions in order to serve the greater community, and to position theatre as a centerpiece of civic discourse and community building.
- 5. Creative Thinking: Students will apply the necessary imaginative and creative skills required to translate both originally devised and pre-existing scripts to the theatrical stage.

Course Requirements:

Students must attend class meetings every week via Zoom or In-Person. In addition, students fulfill the course requirements by EITHER serving in the cast of the production OR working on the crew for the production.

All enrolled students who audition and are cast will be expected to attend all rehearsals and meetings as scheduled by the director(s). Rehearsal days and times will be specified at auditions. If you have any conflicts, they must be listed on your audition form.

All other enrolled students, who are not cast, will be assigned either a position on any of the following teams: Design (Scenic, Lighting, Costume, Sound), Dramaturgy, Stage Management, Music. All students who choose to audition and are not cast will be assigned a running crew position.

Attendance is required of all students at THA 4100 meetings

Important Dates:

Please note that this class meets EVERY WEEK on TUESDAY at 4:15pm.

Grading:

Student will be graded on the following criteria:

- Class attendance, discussion and participation.
- Prompt attendance to all rehearsals and performances.
- Class Discussion & Participation during Master Class and Guest Workshops
- Overall Attitude and Sense of Ensemble Spirit.
- Successfully fulfilling the expectations of your assigned role or crew assignment.
- Weekly Journal Assignments
- Final Reflection Paper
- Students arriving late to any call will receive a significant reduction to their grade. Cast members who are consistently late to or unprepared for rehearsals/meetings may be removed from the production and receive a failing grade for the course.

Call Times:

A call time is NOT an arrival time. A call time is a START time. Make your plans accordingly so that you can arrive 5-10 minutes early and begin promptly as scheduled.

Etiquette and Behavior:

Theatre is a collaborative art. That means that we all work together for the creation of the work. The following is expected of all students.

- To show up on time and be present in the work.
- To maintain a safe atmosphere.
- To work together for the good of the show.
- Not to engage in any activity that threatens other students.
- Not to engage in any activity that is meant to create friction or acrimony amongst others.
- To ask questions.
- To be respectful of others at all times.
- To work actively to create a supportive and creatively inspiring environment.

Failure to adhere to these expectations will result in failing the course.
