Politics

The Department of History is proposing a change in **Course Description** for **Pol 5300: State** and **Local Governments and Politics**

FROM:

The role of state and local governments in the American political system particularly New York State, New York City and representative urban problems. Governmental structure is presented as the permanent yet changing framework within which urban-centered political action takes place.

TO:

An introduction to a contemporary perspective on the powers and responsibilities of state and local governments in the context of understanding how the government of the United States works. This course will focus on the ways that state and local governments both cooperate and conflict with the national government, and on specific topics including elections; state-local-federal relations; and on policy issues, such as education, criminal justice, health and welfare with a particular emphasis on New York City and New York State government and politics. Successful completion of this course satisfies one Civic Engagement interaction.

Rationale for Change:

The old description was incomplete and vague. The new description stresses the introductory structure of the course and gives more detail about what students can expect to learn and what they might be interested in learning.
