RE:	Change in Name of Certificate in Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counseling

The Department of Allied Health, Mental Health & Human Services is proposing a change in the name of the Certificate in Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counseling:

FROM:

Certificate in Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counseling

TO:

Certificate in Addiction Studies

Rationale for Change:

A change in the name of the certificate is being requested to bring it in line with national and local efforts to decrease stigma and to provide a more user-friendly educational, prevention, treatment, and recovery-oriented environment, especially in the light of the opioid epidemic.

Due to its legality, alcohol is often not viewed as a chemical of addiction, hence, the term alcoholism and substance abuse was initially used in the certificate's name to convey that both are the focus of addiction treatment. However, recent trends in the field has highlighted that a change in the certificate's name is warranted.

At the State level, as of May 2019, the regulatory body, the NYS-Office of Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) updated its acronym to the Office of Addiction Services and Supports. As detailed in their press release, "The renaming of OASAS to the Office of Addiction Services and Supports is part of our ongoing efforts to reduce the stigma of addiction

and better highlight the services and support offered to individuals and families across the state" (https://www.wnypapers.com/news/article/current/2019/10/29/138930/nys-oasas-announcesname-change-from-office-of-alcoholism-and-substance-abuse-services-to-office-of-addictionservices-and-supports).

The program's accreditation body, the National Addiction Studies Accreditation Commission (NASAC) has highlighted their receipt of the federal government's encouragement "to create a single higher education addiction studies ... accreditation body to assess academic programs in addiction studies at regionally accredited institutions of higher education" (https://nasacaccreditation.files.wordpress.com/2021/03/nasac_flyer03-2021.pdf).

Professional membership organizations have also updated their names to emphasize addiction. For example, the National Association for Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors (NAADAC), which is one of the primary organizations is now the Association for Addiction Professionals (https://www.naadac.org/).

Lastly, research conducted by the American Psychological Association (APA) and others has enhanced the understanding of the nature and etiology of addiction, especially with regard to its neurobiological aspects. As of 2013, a significant change was thus made in the Diagnostic & Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM V) and the International Classification of Disorders (ICD-10), with gambling being recognized from a diagnostic perspective as an addictive disorder. Since the program has now integrated gambling disorders as one of the core classes, renaming the certificate will ensure that we are accurately reflecting the fundamentals of the field.

Changing the name from the Certificate in Alcoholism & Substance Abuse Counseling to the Certificate in Addiction Studies would thus serve the following:

- 1) Streamline the name and make it more user friendly for potential students to identify and access the program.
- 2) Bring us in line with state regulatory guidance, national accreditation, and professional membership identification.
- 3) Accurately link the knowledge-base of the addiction field to the program's core offerings.
- 4) Advance equity by educating our counselors-in-training to use language that is now recognized as decreasing stigma, and thus removing some of the barriers experienced by persons seeking care for addiction.
