Senior Vice President and Provost, Joanne Russell, served at President Schrader's designee for the meeting and called the meeting to order at 3:09 PM.

### **AGENDA**

I. The minutes of the meeting held on October 3, 2023 were approved by acclamation.

II. Reports

A. The President's Report was replaced by a report from the Senior Vice President and Provost:

Last week, President Schrader sent out her monthly report. I will highlight a few points from her report and then take this opportunity to provide a couple of additional updates from Academic and Student Affairs.

We are still mourning the loss of one of our athletes, Tabidi Abdelmaged, who collapsed and died suddenly after our basketball opener on Friday November 3, 2023. Tabidi was pursuing an associate degree in Physical Education, Recreation and Recreation Therapy. He loved basketball and he loved Kingsborough. I want to recognize and thank Dr. Sharon Warren Cook, Dr. Althea Maduramente, and Director Bobby Allison for providing leadership and walking through this difficult time with Tabidi's family, teammates and coaches.

In October Lisa Khandhar started at Kingsborough as our new Chief Diversity Officer. She is meeting with various faculty, staff and student constituencies. She will be leading the development and implementation of DEI, antisemitism, and anti-AAPI hate trainings. Lisa is also working with Helen Nasser and Nadine Browne to develop additional workshops and forums as part of the Campus Climate initiative.

Earlier this month, we re-organized Student Wellness Services, Access-Ability and TRIO programs under Dr. Althea Maduramente. As the Director of Student Health Services, Dr. Maduramente supervises Access-Ability Services and the Trio program, in addition to all centers under the Student Wellness Services umbrella including: The Counseling Center, The Wellness Center, The Health Center, and The Women's Center. This reorganization reflects our commitment to holistic services that support student health, student wellness and student success.

The College continues to enhance campus security measures. Public Safety, Buildings & Grounds and IT have done extensive work over this past year to improve lighting and add security cameras throughout to campus. The security arms at the entrance were installed for the fall semester, and we have recently implemented a Guest/Visitor Access protocol. We request your patience as we work through improving this protocol based on feedback we have received.

Kingsborough, along with four other CUNY community colleges (BMCC, Hostos, LaGuardia, and Queensborough) has been recognized as one of the top 150 community colleges in the nation eligible to apply for the 2025 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence. To select the top 150 colleges, Aspen uses a model that relies on nationally available data on institutional performance, improvement, and equity in student retention and completion.

The next phase of the process involves submitting a set of specific data and an extensive application describing KCC's student success and equity work in key areas: completion, workforce outcomes, early momentum indicators, and transfer to four-year universities.

I encourage you to participate in the Fall 2023 Diversity/EARS (Equity and Anti-Racism Symposium), "Honoring social justice through the 50-year Anniversary of Hip Hop: A diverse world of voices and expression" which started today and runs through Thursday, as well as the Dean's List Ceremony on Thursday at 4 PM, that recognizes the academic excellence of our students.

Finally, later in the agenda the Curriculum Committee will be presenting extensive curricular proposals. I'd like to highlight three in particular- proposed changes to the Liberal Arts Program to create clear transfer pathways and proposals for two new bridge opportunities in healthcare: a bridge program for Central Sterile Technicians to earn credit in the Surgical Technology program, and a bridge program for LPNs to earn credit in the RN program. I'd like to thank the faculty that worked on these important curricular changes that provide additional educational pathways and improve student success.

B. Budget Report – Vice President for Finance and Administration, Ed. Rios, was unable to attend due to illness.

C. Curriculum Committee Report: Presented by Committee Chair, Mary Dawson:

The following Curriculum Committee resolutions passed unanimously with the sole exception of the creation of a New Course titled *Invitation to the Liberal Arts* (LAS 100A, 100B, 100c, 100E, 100E, 100H, and 100W), which had **one** abstention and **three** No votes.
